
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Rector's Corner

"See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves." -Matthew 10:16

Friends,

I'll admit I hesitated when choosing this scripture as an inspiration for this article. It spoke to me for what I want to say to you but it also is routinely used to objectify and "other" people whom we fear or mistrust. I aim to steer clear of that trap as I write to you about how God sends us into the world as disciples Jesus Christ and apostles of His Good News.

As the new Delta variant infects hundreds of thousands of our citizens, I want to urge caution when in public places and suggest wearing your mask in crowded places even if you're vaccinated. We have had St. Paul's parishioners infected by the Delta variant even after having Covid and being vaccinated. As a reminder, the vaccines work but are not a guarantee against infection by mutations or against passing the mutation along to someone else. In order to be "wise" and "innocent" as we are commended to be please get vaccinated and be careful when out in public. We are being asked to not only protect ourselves but the most vulnerable among us who cannot be vaccinated because of poor health or youth. Please ask your friends and family if they are vaccinated as well and let them know of your experience with the vaccine to reassure them. It is critical that we do our part to love our neighbors by keeping them safe as best we can. Please remember that it will always be acceptable for you to wear a mask when inside St. Paul's for whatever reason you feel necessary.

You may have noticed more folks in Jackson's downtown area panhandling for money in front of shops and on the street corners. Now that churches are back in person, folks are being approached in our parking lot as well. I have had good conversations with friends Steve Castle, head of the Interfaith Shelter and Shante Patterson, head of Love INC about these folks. Both of these organizations who help the homeless and needy in our area have sent teams to speak to these new folks and offer them shelter, food and assistance. In the case of the folks downtown they have been turned down for a variety of reasons. In many cases, struggles related to addiction and mental illness keep folks from using the resources available to them. Their needs are real and not easily met. To answer the questions I've received about the "Christian" response to these needs I recommend the following: If you feel led to give money to folks in the community please do so with a grateful heart and do so safely! If you don't feel safe in any way follow your gut! I don't want anyone to put themselves in a dangerous position feeling that giving money is the only "Christian" response in any situation. There is no one size fits all answer.

If you want to work on the issues surrounding homelessness in our community please contact me and I'll help you find the organizations doing the most good in our community. You'll see an advertisement in this newsletter for the Interfaith Shelter Block Party this Saturday from 11-3. I invite you to stop by and meet the staff, residents and community around the Shelter. We are so grateful for their work and proud to be partners with them.

Finally, let us remember that when Jesus speaks about lambs and wolves the language He uses is parabolic in nature, meaning, sometimes we're the lambs and sometimes we're the wolves. Let us remember that erring on the side of generosity and love are always good impulses and never hesitate to call on me or Alice, our parish administrator, for questions regarding folks in need. We interact with lots of folks each week and, because of your generosity, get to help many neighbors.

"HOLY GLASS"

A Tour of the Windows of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Jackson, MI Part 3

By 1900, St. Paul's Episcopal Church was well established within the Jackson community and even more memorial windows were being installed. Interestingly, the installation of the Resurrection window (L-3) required moving the window known as "Christ with his Followers" from the L-3 position to the R-2 position! I have not been able to find any record of why this move occurred. Perhaps the location change was requested by families and the Vestry and Priest agreed to relocate the Mabley window. We have photo documentation of the relocation.



Let's look more closely at the R-2 Mabley window, "Christ with his Followers" or "Christ Teaching." It was given by the Mabley family "to the glory of God and in memory of the family of Joseph and Martha B. Mabley." The inscription reads, "for where 2 or 3 are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." The window is made in a glass style similar to the early Payne Spears and Tiffany Studios. The colors are rich reds, greens, blues and golds with minimal added painting on the glass for hands and faces. Christ's gesture appears to be one of blessing and he is clothed in red and white robes.

Anytime we see a figure in a Christian church window in red and white we know it is Jesus – white for purity and red for the blood he shed for the sins of us all.

Our next window is the Resurrection Window in the L-3 position.

The angel sits before the empty tomb pointing toward heaven. The inscription reads: "I am the resurrection and the life. To the glory of God and in loving memory of Michael Shoemaker 1818-1895 and of Sarah Wisner Shoemaker 1829-1891."

This window was created by extensive painting on glass panels to portray the scene when the three Marys come to the tomb and find that Christ has risen. They are Mary, Christ's mother, Mary Magdalene and Mary, wife of Clopas. There is a lighted lamp burning in the opening of the tomb symbolizing the risen Christ. The angel points heavenward. The panel above the resurrection scene shows the risen Christ (center) on a throne with St. Paul (left) with his sword and scriptures. young children around Christ (center) and on the right side we see a seated woman with an anchor. She appears to be an anchoress – a woman who devotes here life to prayer and service to the poor and sick.

This window would benefit from an extensive cleaning by a professional studio. It was made by the Heaton, Butler and Bayne Studio in London, England. Always let me know if you have further questions since there is more information available on our windows than I can include in these articles.

Innovations of E. M. Skinner, Organ Builder

A perforated paper roll (like those used in player pianos) for the pipe organ? That was one of E. M. Skinner's many experiments and inventions in the early days of pipe organs that could now use electricity. Although Skinner's research did get him a patent on a refinement in the player piano mechanism, the player piano roll was not an invention that proved to be successful with the pipe organ.

Prior to this time in the late 1800's/early 1900's, most American builders were building "tracker action" organs using traditional European methods. Organs used a series of slender wooden rods (trackers) for each key that mechanically opened a little valve allowing air to flow into each pipe. The more sets of pipes an organist used (to make a piece louder or more musically colorful), the more finger strength it took to push down the key on the keyboard. This is because the organist was physically moving so many levers connected to the key and overcoming the wind pressure against the valves. With the use of batteries and/or electricity, the wind chambers no longer had to be pumped full of air by hand and the key action could be electronically assisted so that no matter how many ranks of pipes an organist used, the keys were all equally to play. Skinner was very involved in new designs and innovations that incorporated the changes that electricity allowed.

Many of Skinner's most innovative improvements to the organ came with his invention of new stops. Skinner wanted smoothness and subtlety in his organs. He wanted them to imitate the beauty of orchestral sounds. He invented a stop called the erzähler (storyteller) with quiet solo tones. Skinner said that this stop had a "talkative" quality. After hearing an oboe in concert, Skinner went to his workshop and designed a pipe to sound like that oboe. He invented a "tuba mirabilis" with some 32-foot pipes as large as small elevator shafts. Some invented stops became his trademark, like the flute celeste, which has two ranks of flute pipes slightly out of tune with each other to produce a shimmering beat. Another was the English horn, a modified oboe stop. On the St. Paul's Skinner organ, we have some lush flutes, lovely strings, and a beautiful Clarinet stop, which is one of my favorites to use as a solo stop. We also have some great trumpet stops, including the fabulous Trumpet en Chamade, the powerful, horizontally mounted trumpet on the back wall. If you are ever interested in seeing a list of all of the ranks (sets of pipes) on the St, Paul organ, come up to the organ and I'll have a copy for you.

Some great organ stops NOT invented by E. M. Skinner. Hee, Hee!




