

Friends,

In this holy season of Advent we are given a gift of focus and quiet. You might be asking how you could possibly find the time for focus and quiet when there's so much to DO! I get it, I really do. The gift of Advent is opened by making time for God or we could ignore it and miss out on all this holy time will bring us. So much of our lives seem to be on a treadmill of work, shopping, kids' activities, travel and parties. We won't really be able to be present with our family, friends and even ourselves if we don't take time to prepare our hearts and contemplate what Jesus' incarnation means for us.

My hope is that you will consider stepping into one of these leadership roles and work with the B&G team to make our physical plant thrive.

We need more teachers to work with our children and youth in Christian Education. We have such great kids and could use more people who want to help support them and their families. Please consider becoming a part of that support system and getting to know our fantastic kids and families!

As we prepare for Christmas let us remember that the greatest need any of us have is being loved for the precious child of God we are. The material and financial needs of our community are real and underlying them all are the love and belonging we crave. The best gift you can give is your presence and I hope your Advent and Christmas are full of the loving presence of family and friends.

Our Jewish brothers and sisters start their Hanukkah season on November 28, the same day we start the season of Advent. Kwanzaa, celebrated by our African American brothers and sisters, starts December 26. Ironically the feast of the Immaculate Conception is on December 8. This was always a very special day in our family growing up. It was considered a holy day of obligation for Catholics and children had the day off from school. It was traditionally the day when we went to see Santa and to buy our Christmas finery. We loved that day and the tradition that came with it. December 26 is boxing day and is so named because that was the day the alms collection boxes found in churches were opened.

Organist's Corner



An Organist's Faith Story

I often think that I come to Scripture in what I call a “backwards” manner. Being a lifelong lover of hymnody, I will find myself intrigued by the text of a hymn, especially new ones, and then set out to find the related passages in Scripture. One of my favorite new hymns (written by fellow graduates of my alma mater, Wittenberg University), has this text:

“Beloved, God’s chosen, put on as a garment, compassion, forgiveness, and goodness of heart. Above all, before all, let love be your raiment that binds into one every dissonant part.”

The poetic words come from Colossians 3:12-16. “Therefore, as the elect of God, Holy and Beloved, clothes yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. Bear with each other and forgive any complaint you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which is the bond of perfect unity. Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, for to this you were called as members of one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God.”

I do not always find reading or reciting Scripture to be a comfort to me, but to sing it, to have the words flowing through my heart, to have those words be my “theme song” – that is what can provide me with emotional support in times of trial. Over the last few years, I have watched my mother, then my father, and finally my mother-in-law struggle with declining health after falls and broken bones that eventually led to their deaths. I often failed to feel that God could want His Beloved in such tormented health situations. I sometimes had difficulty feeling God’s presence as I sat at my parents’ bedsides, spending weeks and months far from home in an emotionally trying situation.

But, to support, console, and encourage me, I had my hymns of faith - the Word of God set to music by the hymn writers from the earliest times to the present. The Scripture in many hymns gave me comfort and assurance. Christmas hymns gave my mother comfort just days before she died, when my sons and I sang of Jesus’s birth and she tried to mouth some words with us. One of my sons wrote me a poem after I had recovered from cancer the second time. He wrote about the hymn, “Healer of Our Every Ill,” which was my “theme song” during that difficult time of surgeries and treatment. While my son is not sure that our lives will never again be touched by serious illness or other difficulties, he wrote that he has that hymn to support his faith, just in case. (You can read that text in Worship & Rejoice #630.)

We are all the Beloved, God’s Chosen. We can let the love of Christ dwell in our hearts, and feel gratitude, assurance, and comfort as we sing, listen to, and ponder the hymns and other music of the Church.




