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# Rector's Corner

## Time, Talent and Treasure

As a new calendar year begins, many people think about what they want or need to stop, start, or change in some way over the months ahead. Many of those decisions have to do with our time, our talent, and our treasure . . . how we put to good use the gifts God has given us.

At the beginning of each calendar/fiscal year, most organizations also have to think about this, usually in a very structured way involving a budget. We here at St. Paul's are certainly in the midst of that, and there are some difficult decisions we need to navigate this year.

Too often, though, we tend to downplay or overlook the time and talent part of all that. But time and again we are reminded in the scriptures that God works at least as much, if not much more so, with our immaterial resources than with our material ones. Our time and talent matter a lot. And when we put them to use in God's name, somehow we often end up getting back more than we have given.

We have a lot to do this year as a church family. In addition to maintaining (and even doubling down on) our commitments to inspiring worship, nourishing Christian formation for all ages, and faithful mission and outreach, we also have a meaningful amount of work that needs to happen for the search process to unfold successfully, and we have some vitally important work to do to revitalize and refresh a range of other responsibilities, especially membership, pastoral care, and finance/stewardship. I will have more to say about the needs I see in these areas at the annual meeting on January 22, and I really hope you will be part of that important meeting and conversation.

In the meantime, I would like to ask you to start thinking about what you, personally, are currently committing to St. Paul's in terms of time and talent. I'm not asking about how you gave of yourself in the past. I'm asking about now and in this year to come. The apostle Paul reminds us in his First Letter to the Corinthians that there are a variety of gifts, but the implication is that we all have some and we are all called to use them in service of God and God's church. Are you?

In the very near future you will start to see a "help wanted" section in our various communication pieces. Please look for something you can say yes to, especially if you don't already have a "job" to do in this wonderful church family. Many hands make light(er) work AND accomplish more.

I'm excited about this year. I can sense God calling St. Paul's in both new and continuing ways . . . and I look forward to pursuing all that with you.

## From our Sr. Warden...

Dear St. Paul's,

Greetings and welcome to 2023. A new year with new opportunities to take advantage of and new barriers to break down. In the coming year we will be transformed into a different church once again. We will see changes in the way we do things, we will attract new visitors, we will sing new songs, enlist new members and call a new Pastor. The only thing that will stay the same is constant change.

St. Paul's will change in 2023 and we will direct that change. We must be in control. If we are to attract a top-of-the-line priest, we need to exhibit a top-notch church. That means an invested congregation. Invested in the mission, invested in the liturgy, invested in the other members, invested in financial support.

Our pledges this year for whatever reason, are short by over \$50,000. There may be several reasons for this, and everyone must evaluate their own situation as does the church. Our expenses have gone up like everyone else, but we are trying to stay at last year's numbers. We do not want to cut important people or programs. First, if you have not pledged, please do so. It is nice to have non-pledged income, but we cannot make a budget if we do not know what to expect. Second, if everyone that has pledged so far was to increase their pledge by \$862, we would clear up this deficit. That is less than \$17 a week or \$2.50 per day. Please reconsider your pledge as we are all in this together.

As we continue into the new year, the annual meeting is on schedule for January 22. The search committee is working toward their objectives and Rev. Jadon is providing new and interesting services. Julie and Jeff are working to provide new and interesting music, and you will see the new banners on both sides of the church. Our church is unique in its service and our openness to everyone. We must make sure that the disenchanted know we are open. Look for other changes moving forward.

On Sunday the 15<sup>th</sup>, plan to attend between the services in Holy Spirit Hall for Rev. Jadon's monthly talk on the role and plans of the Interim Ministry.

I would like to welcome Kyle King back into the important role of Buildings and Grounds. He has handled this expertly in the past and I am delighted to see him back.

Rhonda and I are hoping you all were safe and warm during this Christmas season and may you all have a Happy New Year.

### January Focus

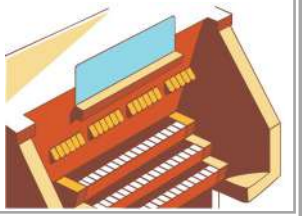

### Christopher Lock

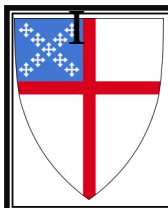
Our Annual Congregational Meeting will be held in Holy Spirit Hall after the 10:30 am service on **Sunday, January 22nd.**

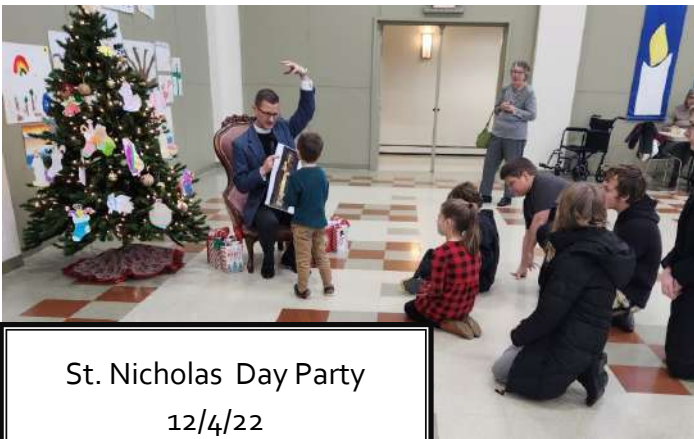
