Friends,

Lent is upon us! As we begin this journey together I encourage you to make space to keep Lent in your daily life these next six weeks before Holy Week and Easter. There are so many resources out there to help you keep Lent. Your Lenten journey can be as simple or as complex as you want to make it! Making and taking time each day for prayer, reading the Bible, reading a devotional book, fasting (as you feel led to) from food or social media or harsh words or any number of things can help as well. I usually try to balance Lent by fasting from something and taking something on. If you fast a meal each week then use that money/time/energy to give of yourself to a person or organization in need. Focus your prayers on a person or people whom you are concerned about releasing them to God's loving care. Read a book or listen to a speaker on a subject that brings you joy. Use Lent as the gift it is...time to understand God's love for you and this world we live in.

Lent is not a time for self-help regimens designed to make us better versions of ourselves but rather a time to focus on God's love for us and what we allow to get in the way of living in that love. In the end, we hopefully expect God will help us resemble Jesus Christ rather than polished versions of ourselves. Giving ourselves up to God's love in whatever Lenten practice we take up will allow us to experience Jesus' Way of Love and join Him on that Way.

Please note: it is the custom of the Church to keep fasts for specific seasons but not on Sundays because each Sunday is a Feast of the Resurrection of our Lord. Our liturgy changes to reflect the season and allow space for silence, reflection and deep connection with God. So, don't skip church because you think it'll be boring! And don't forget to break your fast on Sunday so you can refresh yourself and reflect on the meaning of your fast surrounded by God's love.

As always, I'm available for prayer and conversation during this reflective season as well as the Sacrament of Reconciliation also known as Confession for any individual who desires it. Sometimes our burdens can only be lifted when they are confessed privately to a caring priest. I've used this beautiful Sacrament in my own life many times and am happy to provide it to you should you desire it. I pray you have a blessed and fruitful Lent and ask your prayers for my own Lenten journey...

Building & Grounds

February 2019 was full of challenges. Several unscheduled events and weather challenges occurred. However not getting lost in the mayhem we were up to the task. It takes trust and communication in keeping the walkways and parking clear for the events as scheduled around our facility. Safety was not a concern and Aladdin, our contract provider for HVAC, arrived to inspect the ignition system and gave the " all ok". A broken kneeler in the nave was reported, then replaced by Dennis Marsh, Nathan Randall, Michelle Gibson. Good job team! Motion light in the south room behind the baptismal font is to be replaced. New piano needs water, regularly, especially in the winter. We need a schedule of persons to respond, outside of buildings and grounds. B&G will continue to supply RO water to fill the damper on the piano.

Our Sexton Sam McKaney has been under the weather recently. Many here have been stepping in, helping with the expectation of his return soon. Please pray for Sam's speedy recovery.

Safety Systems Inc. has yet to complete the install of a remote door release on the South Jackson St. entrance controlled from Admin. Office.

The Safety & Emergency planning committee has been busy. We need folks that have signed up to participate now. The framework is becoming clearer. The future of St. Paul's response to the adversity of physical or weather-related events will become the responsibility and participation of all parishioners committed to our parish and this committee. We need six people that attended the meeting presented by the Michigan State Police on safety to respond to this call, call Kyle King 745-7569. On the thought as to weather related events, Red Cross of Jackson County has asked about our Parish becoming an Emergency Shelter in the event of a catastrophic event in the Jackson area. The paperwork will be presented to the vestry again in the month of March. You need to provide input as to your questions and or approval prior to their meeting on March 19th. Are we ready to offer our facility to others in the future of this unannounced event?

Mission & Outreach

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

St. Paul's Mission and Outreach and Episcopal Church Women are joining forces to host a first annual fundraiser for SOAR Cafe and Farms this Spring!

If you recall, Michelle Cochran, founder of SOAR, was our guest at the Harvest Dinner in November of 2018. She gave her testimony of how she has been directed by God to work with women in our community who have been victims of sex and drug trafficking, sexual abuse and addiction. She created a nonprofit, entitled SOAR Cafe and Farms, that meets women where they are, most often in jail, to provide spiritual support as they navigate their way through the judicial system toward a fulfilling future, free from the bondage of shame, addiction and abuse. As a co-chair of M&O, I was so moved by Michelle's testimony that I invited her to our January meeting. We unanimously voted to support her work and vision for SOAR.

The Women of St. Paul's (ECW) and M&O are sponsoring a luncheon/ fundraiser/awareness event on Saturday, May 11, 2019 from 11-1:30 pm in Holy Spirit Hall. The cost of the event is \$20 per person, to cover the cost of the meal, etc. We want to increase awareness of this powerful organization, raise money for their jail ministry and the future dream of a home for these women after they leave jail or prison.

This is where all of us come in...

We have 24 round tables that each seat 8 people. (192 total guests) We are in need of St. Paul's women to sponsor at least one table of 8. (We already have four table sponsors!!) The event will be the day before Mother's Day, so it is the perfect opportunity to invite the favorite women in your lives, mothers, grandmothers, sisters, aunts, nieces and BFF's to attend this event. It will be a catered gourmet lunch, handbag chance drawing and program.

Technology Report



This winter brought the inauguration of a new group serving St. Paul's: the Technology committee. Pastor Sarah welcomed Nathan Randall, James Grant, Jim Grace and myself in late January, emphasizing that technology touches all members of the parish.

Our first meeting began with approving a mission statement, as follows: The St. Paul's Technology Committee seeks to aid parishioners in embracing Christ's presence by facilitating healthy technology systems. There are three basic ways we will accomplish this mission. One, we will operate A/V systems for parish events. Two, we will research and implement IT solutions for administration and outreach. Three, we will facilitate education, repair and upgrades for all parish systems. These are some big responsibilities, but we are beginning with bite-sized chunks.

We started work by reviewing needs identified by the 2017 technology audit, Pastor Sarah, and individual team members. In the first quarter of 2019 the group is focusing on the following projects: replace the security system monitor in the office; inventory items throughout the church and dispose of/recycle legacy technology; and explore current pricing for mesh Wi-Fi throughout the building. I will give updates in future newsletters as we make progress toward these goals.

Members of the committee are eager to hear from you in our first months of work. If you know of needs we should add to our list please don't hesitate to reach out!
