Rector's Corner



Being Good Stewards of St. Paul's

Money is probably the last thing that a new rector, interim or otherwise, wants to have as their first order of business. So when I learned that the annual stewardship campaign was coinciding with my first days and weeks with you, I was initially less than excited. Don't get me wrong, I've been through this little pledge card dance we all do many times before - both as a priest and as a person in the proverbial pews. I've filled out my fair share of pledge cards, including ones from St. Paul's! I've already submitted my pledge for this next year, and I enthusiastically hope you will too!

As you will undoubtedly hear me talk about over the months to come, according to the Gospels, Jesus actually said quite a bit about how he wants us to generously, joyfully, unhesitatingly **give** rather than protectively, fearfully *guard* the material resources that we have come to have some control over. This whole business of dedicating a meaningful amount of that to God each year, by way of the Church, is about much more than meeting a budget. It is arguably one of the most meaningful and/or difficult of all the spiritual practices and disciplines. And you so will hear me talk about "stewardship" with some frequency . . . not just during pledge card season.

I actually think naming our annual collection of giving commitments a "stewardship" campaign is a little bit of a misnomer, perhaps. As a component of our faith, stewardship is about so much more than our pledge or tithe or financial giving. It's about how we care for all that God has entrusted to us, which can be measured not just with dollar signs but in so many other ways.

One of our most valuable treasures is our church. Yes, I mean the building, in part. But even more so I mean the health and vitality of our church's mission and ministry. I mean how this church is helping you and others thrive spiritually and grow in our knowledge of God's Word. How we are being a support to one another and to all the neighbors Jesus has encouraged us to embrace wholeheartedly. How we are magnifying God's light and love into our city and our world.

Interim times, the times between long-term clergy leaders, are perfect times for churches to think about how they are doing all that. Is St. Paul's being called to live out its mission and ministry in some new or different way given who we are as a community today? Where have we grown stagnant or need some kind of renewal or reinvestment?

I'm honored to be in a role now, and over the next year or so, that is designed to help you question and think about all of that. My work and ways will be in some ways different, during this time, than if I were your long-term rector. And so I want to ask, right up front, for both your patience and your full commitment (financially and otherwise) as we make our way down this somewhat uncharted interim road together . . . and work together to see how God is calling you to steward St. Paul's into its next chapter.

The month of October is at an end and the leaves, which have put on such a beautiful display, are finally falling. October will end with Halloween or the feast of all Hallows, and November will begin with all Saints day on November 1.

Originally the druidic, Celtic, or pagan festival of Samhain (sow-in), it was reclaimed by the Catholic church and renamed eve of all Hallows or Halloween. The church named November 1 as All Saints Day, thus removing any link to druidism and pagan festivals. But the beliefs lived on in the hearts and minds of the Celtic people and so it is still celebrated today. It is the day when the veil between the world of the living and the dead is removed or thinned. Spirits can move among us and thus we are closer to our dead loved ones and ancestors.

All fires were extinguished before the festival and the druid priests would light a new fire into which the bones of sacrificed animals were thrown. This was known as the "bone-fire" and later became the bonfire we know today. Torches were lit from this fire and taken back to cottages to rekindle extinguished home fires. History is rich in stories and talismans to ward off the more evil of the spirits.

Now down to business. On October 1 we had the great pleasure of having Rev. Melissa to talk to us about her other career s a police officer on the MSU campus. It was a wonderful talk and so great to see Melissa in a role she is so experienced and comfortable in. We had a wonderful turn-out of women for this talk. The information she shared was amazing and such a contrast to her role as our curate and now priest in charge at St. Katherine's in Williamston. We cannot thank Rev. Melissa enough for sharing her 30 years of experience with us all.

Meet Jeff Wilkinson St. Paul's Choir Director

After some months of searching, interviewing, and having candidates conduct “interview rehearsals” with a group of St. Paul singers, we have hired Mr. Jeff Wilkinson. Jeff will begin working with us in November. All who have met him or been involved in the rehearsal that he conducted, are excited to begin singing under his direction. Jeff comes to us with a strong Episcopalian background, including over eight years as a professional singer at Christ Church Episcopal in Grosse Pointe, a church with an extensive music program of multiple choirs and a concert series.

Jeff has some roots in Grand Rapids and grew up in a very musical family. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Television-Radio-Film from Syracuse University. He continued on to the University of Michigan, where he graduated summa cum laude with a Bachelor of Music degree in Vocal Performance. Following that, he studied at the School of Theology at St. John's University in Collegeville, MN. He graduated with a Master of Arts degree with a focus on the practical and philosophical aspects of music ministry, as well as theology, liturgy, the sacraments, church history, ethics, spirituality, hymns, psalms, chant, choral literature, multicultural music, organ, conducting, and voice.

Mr. Wilkinson is a tenor who has sung for many years as a tenor soloist in operatic and concert work. While at UM, he was able to enhance his studies in opera by studying abroad in Italy. He is frequently requested for weddings and funerals and as a cantor for church services.

I am looking forward to having such a talented and knowledgeable musician to work with to enhance the worship services at St. Paul's. He is very thoughtful and thorough and shares my love of spreadsheets to keep music organized. I want to express my great appreciation to the members of the hiring committee for their time, diligence, and sound advice. I am also very grateful to all the singers who gave of their time to come for our interview rehearsals and shared their thoughts on the candidates for the choir director job. Seeing a choir director in action provides a level of information that cannot be gleaned from an interview.

Please join me in making Jeff feel welcome at St. Paul's! He looks forward to meeting everyone in the congregation and becoming part of our church family.






Daylight Saving Time

Pledging FAQ's

Your commitment in response to God's blessings makes our worship, community life, and outreach possible. We hope these "frequently asked questions" will be helpful to you as you consider your pledge.

What is a pledge?

A pledge is your commitment to make a financial gift that supports the mission of St. Paul's. Pledging is a response to God's abundance in our lives. It is both a statement of thanksgiving and a lived decision to give others as God gives to us.

Why do we need annual pledges?

Your pledge supports everything we do – from paying the salaries of our staff to supporting our outreach ministries, our pastoral care, our worship, our education programs, and our music. In order to know what we can do each year, we need pledge commitments to develop an annual budget.

Can't we just rely on our endowment?

We do have an endowment generously left to us by previous generations of St. Paul's parishioners. It would quickly disappear, however, if we relied on it as our primary source of parish support.

How much should I pledge?

At St. Paul's, every pledge, no matter what amount, makes a valued contribution to our mission and ministry. We ask each parishioner to prayerfully consider making a pledge that is both responsible and significant based on their financial situation.

Our standard of giving should reflect our standard of living. A tithe (10% of your income) has long been held as the standard of each Christian giving. For most it is a goal to be reached through incremental increases each year. To calculate your pledge or tithe, the following chart may help:

When and how should I pledge?

Pledges are welcome throughout the year, but we would prefer to receive them before December 1st so we can plan for next year. You can make a pledge by bringing pledge card to church, by mailing it in, or by contacting a staff person or member of the Vestry.

Do I have to pay when I pledge? Can I pay in installments?

A pledge is a promise to pay. You may fulfill your pledge with as many or few payments as you wish. Pledges are to be fulfilled on a calendar year basis, beginning January 1.

Can I pay by a gift of stock, a donor-designated fund, or through other means?

We welcome all kinds of pledge payments. You may pay by a gift of stock or financial securities, or through a donor-designated fund. To find out how, contact **Marco Shehab**.

What happens if I can't give as much as I pledged?

While it's a commitment to your church and your fellow parishioners, God's grace abounds. If your circumstances change, let the church know that you need to change your pledge. If you've received unexpected additional income, you are always welcome to increase your pledge.

Who knows how much I pledge?

We hold all pledge amounts in the strictest confidence.
