



Rector's Corner

"When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." Luke 5:4

Friends,

Your Vestry had a fantastic retreat day with our diocesan Congregational Development officer leading us as we discern where God might be calling this parish. One thing was made very clear, our parish puts a very high value on worshipping together and the quality of Sunday worship. As you know, just before pandemic, our former choir director left after Easter. Not being able to sing for over a year and not having a choir director left the burden of arranging for and playing our music to our amazing organist Julie Baglien. Julie asked me a few months ago if we would be willing to make her our permanent organist with a letter of agreement and updated job description. I was overjoyed that she wanted to become our organist and helped craft a letter of agreement with our new Human Resources Committee. This letter was presented to the Vestry and approved with joy. Julie's talent and her faithfulness is a great gain for St. Paul's and I will rely heavily on her as we begin a search for a new choir director.

As we come to the end of another pandemic year we pray mightily and plan for growth and vigor in the New Year. To build our choir and music program we will need to hire an energetic and skilled choir director who will provide the choral foundation of our liturgical worship. Like the organist position this will be a part-time job and one which we hope will attract a talented local choir director. We will be building a job description and start a search in the coming weeks. I ask your prayers for this endeavor and I ask you to consider this area of growth for our parish as you think about your pledge this year.

We are so grateful for our faithful pledging members and that our investments have been steady and strong throughout this stressful time. We will need to increase our budget next year to attract and pay for a choir director that has the talent we desire. We have increased the salary for our organist position to match the experience and skill Julie brings to her work and what other area churches pay their organists. We are investing in our future. Let me say that again...We are investing in our future! Please consider increasing your pledge for 2022 so we may build our choir and music ministry for our immediate needs and for future worshippers at St. Paul's. Our prayers and hymns are central to who we are as the Episcopal branch of Christendom and we are grateful for this beautiful heritage.

You will receive our annual pledge letter this month and we ask you to prayerfully consider becoming a pledging member of St. Paul's or if you are already pledging, please consider increasing that pledge by 5% for 2022. That incremental increase will go a long way in our hiring for the future of our music program. God bless and keep you as we enter Fall and I look forward to a lovely Feast of All Saints with you in November.

"HOLY GLASS"

A Tour of the Windows of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Jackson, MI Part 5


We have been discussing the most often noted and loved windows in our Chapel and Sanctuary. These also tend to be our earlier windows. This month we're going to visit nine windows which are either rarely seen or are often seen but seldom noticed due to their locations.

The first group of windows are found in the former connector passage from the Nave to Camp Hall. When Camp Hall was demolished and Holy Spirit Hall added, it was decided to keep part of the former back hallway for a storage area and potential future use. The best place to view these windows is from the Memorial Garden in the fall and winter, when the leaves have fallen. They are made of a glass known as "glue chip" glass. It is decorative and inexpensive, so it was ideal for an early passageway.



The next four windows are also smaller in size and are found in the Narthex and Choir Loft. We have all walked by the Narthex windows, busily heading for Church or chatting with friends before or after the service. We don't tend to stop and appreciate the two windows there. The first window, to the south of the front doors, depicts the boy, Jesus. He is dressed in a white and gold tunic. One hand points toward heaven, while the other hand points to his heart. We see the Christogram – IHS, on his tunic (an ancient symbolic way of writing "Jesus Christ.")

His image is surrounded by a border of three leafed vines and roses, with subtle Trinitarian images of clover in the background. The inscription reads: "To the honored memory of Jessie C. Ball - 1866-1944."





Opposite this window on the north side of the door is another window depicting a young Mary, the mother of Jesus. She also wears a halo and holds a lily – her symbol of purity, and gazes heavenward. Her inscription reads: "Of such is the Kingdom of Heaven." Both of these windows were created by the Payne Spears Studio in Patterson, N.J. in 1944-45.

Then take the stairs up to the balcony to see our last two windows. On the south side of the west wall we find a window with a geometric background that contains images of crossed whips and crossed keys. Jesus gave Peter the Keys of the Kingdom of Heaven. One key is gold and the other silver. The gold key represents the power to bind and loose in heaven (spiritual authority). While the silver key represents the power to bind and loose on earth. The whips symbolize the suffering of Christ before his crucifixion. The companion window contains an image of a Chrysmatory, which contains three types of holy oils. The first oil is oil of Chrism, the second is oil of Catacumens, and the third is oil of the Sick. These windows were dedicated to "the Glory of God and in loving memory of William C. Harvey and Susie M. Harvey," in the 1960's and made by the Lamb Studios of Ridgewood, N.J.

Meet Your New Organist



I'm sure that some of you are wondering how I can be your "new" organist when I have been with you for almost three years. When I began playing at St. Paul's, I was also the half-time organist at University Lutheran Church, East Lansing (where I first worked with Pr. Sarah). I would split the month between the two churches and my colleagues, Karen and Bob, would play at St. Paul's when I was at ULC. With the COVID pandemic, ULC has stayed with Facebook services while St. Paul's went to livestream. I was able to provide recorded music for ULC while playing every Sunday at St. Paul's. I have now decided to leave ULC and make St. Paul's my permanent "organist home." I so appreciate the way that I have been welcomed here and the many wonderful comments about the organ music each Sunday.

My parents were Scandinavian Lutherans from North Dakota who took their family on a great adventure to the former American Canal Zone in Panamá. They loved it so much that they stayed until they retired. That is the tropical paradise where I grew up, in the shadow of one of the greatest engineering feats in the world. I studied piano, then organ, and my first job, at age 14, was as organist at our church, Redeemer Lutheran, in Balboa, CZ. I also worked as the accompanist for my high school choir of 150 voices.


I returned to the U.S. for college and graduated from Wittenberg University, in Ohio, with a Bachelor's degree in Church Music as an organ major. I also earned a Bachelor's degree in Music Education. I moved to Michigan, got an organist job, and began a teaching career in Charlotte where I taught music and then taught elementary classrooms, mostly second grade. I also earned a Master's degree from MSU in Education.

I met my husband in the Canal Zone where he spent two years studying monkeys for his Ph.D. from MSU. Over the years our family grew to include our four sons (Evan, Ethan, Erik, and

Eston) and now two daughters-in-law. The boys were all involved in music in various ways, including being great pageturners and stop-pullers for their mom! We live out in the far northwest corner of Jackson County. Our sons all graduated from Springport High School and I was elected to serve for 20 years on the Springport Board of Education.


